Course Overview

Students will understand social studies concept of "community" as it pertains to local and state history, geography, government, and economics.

Students will understand the following standards:

- 1) Choices have consequences.
- 2) Individuals have rights and responsibilities.
- 3) Societies are shaped by beliefs, idea, and diversity.
- 4) Societies experience continuity and change over time.
- 5) Relationships between people, place, idea, and environments are dynamic.

Social Studies (grade 3) courses build on previous knowledge and introduce concepts in the social studies disciplines: history, geography, civics and government, and economics. Instruction of the disciplines is often integrated for instructional purposes. Students may study these disciplines through the context of a specific theme or discipline, such as state-based social studies or U.S. history.
