Slavery expanded rapidly in the English Colonies during the 1700's, especially in the Southern Colonies.

British taxes led to greater cooperation among colonies.

The Colonists Rebel

Events in Boston brought Britain and the colonies closer to war.

The Revolution Begins

The American Revolution began with the battles at Lexington and Concord.

Topic: Winning the Revolution Duration: 4 Week(s)

Topic Overview

Students explore the events of the American Revolution, including the Declaration of Independence, contributions from foreign allies, and ultimately the Americans winning their independence.

Learning Targets

Declaring Independence

American colonies declared independence from Brittain in July 1776.

Patriots at War

The contributions of a wide variety of people helped the continental army win important battles.

The World Turned Upside Down

With help from France and Spain, the Continental Army won the American Revolution.
