
If you have been to the PLHS office recently, you may have noticed a poster to the left of the main window. The poster is titled "What Do Employers Expect of Me as an Employee?" Here are a few of the expectations listed: *Come to work every day....on time, Concentrate on my work and care about the quality of my work, Be honest and dependable, Dress properly and practice good grooming, Be cooperative, and Have a positive attitude, communicate well and get along with other people...especially customers.*

One of our main goals at PLHS is to prepare students for the work force. For some students, this will be directly after they finish high school. Want to stay in touch with what is going on at the High School on a daily basis? Please remember that you can access the PLHS daily announcements through Power School. To access Power School, go to the district website, (www.usd343.org) and click on the Power School icon on the right side of the page. Use your parent user name and password to gain access. You can view your student's lunch account, daily announcements, grades, teachers' comments, discipline, attendance history in your student's Power School account. The daily announcements are updated every morning, so it is a great way to keep up with what is going on in Kaw Country.

AFTER SCHOOL STUDENT PICK-UP INFORMATION

Parents interested in picking up their students from school are requested to pick up their students from the South parking lot. We are instructing car-riding students to exit the building from the South exit. Using this exit will expedite the pick-up of your children as well as alleviate any problems with parking in the bus zone. We appreciate your compliance in this request.

STUDENT/PARENT HANDBOOK

The Perry-Lecompton Student/Parent Handbook is located on the district website: www.usd343.org. You may also access this handbook in your student's planner! The student/parent handbook provides valuable information about school rules and policies and is a great source of general information for both student and parent.

ELECTRONIC DEVICES

Student use of personal music devices are prohibited in the classrooms, **with the exception of seminar**. Students using these personal music devices must abide by the current seminar rules and be working on academic material. Music level must be low as to not disturb other students. Teachers have the right to ban personal music devices from their room should students fail to follow seminar rules. Students are allowed to carry cell phones during the school day, but are not allowed to use these devices during class time. Students are allowed to check their phones for messages between classes. There **may** be times teachers ask students to use their cell phones for class instruction. Cell phone/personal music combinations units **ARE** classified as cell phones and are not allowed during class time. Parents should call the office when trying to reach students in an emergency situation and not contact students through their cell phone during class time. Violation of the cell phone or electronic device policy will result in confiscation of such articles. Articles will not be returned until the appropriate detention time has been served. **PLHS Handbook, pages 5 and 6.**

BUILDING HOURS

To avoid potential problems, add to security, and provide adequate supervision, students are requested to report to the building no earlier than 7:30 a.m. and leave each afternoon by 3:30 p.m. unless they are under the direct supervision of a faculty member or coach of the school district.

Access to the building during school hours will be limited to the front (east) doors. All other doors will be locked to outside access after 8:16 a.m. Visitors are to report to the office upon entry to the building.

The high school office is open from 7:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. An answering machine is available for messages before and after office hours. We are very appreciative when parents call and inform us when their student(s) will be absent. The office window becomes available to students at 7:50 a.m.

FAMILY LEAVE REQUEST

A Request for Student Personal Leave form is available in the office and must be turned into the administration for approval prior to departure. All trips are not automatically approved. Current attendance status will be one determinant. Academic arrangements must be made prior to leaving.

STUDENT ABSENCES

A student is considered absent when he or she is not in regular school classes or involved in a school sponsored activity. If a student is absent, an attempt will be made by the staff to verify the absence by a call to the parents. This call will not be necessary if a parent or guardian calls early on the morning of a student's absence and reports it to the secretary.

Upon return from an absence, a student is required to obtain an admit slip from the office prior to attending class. An excuse, written or oral, from a parent or guardian must be provided within 24 hours of the absence. Upon receipt of the excuse, a determination will be made as to the excused or unexcused status of the absence. All absences due to doctor/dental appointments are required to bring the "receipt" from the office visit for verification that it was a medically excused absence. The principal will be the final determiner in all cases concerning absences.

For more information regarding ATTENDANCE information, please see page 17 of the Student Parent Handbook in your student's planner.

HOMEWORK: On the second consecutive day of absence, a parent may call the high school office by 9:00 a.m. and request homework assignments for the absent days. Homework can be picked up at the office between 3:00 and 3:30 p.m.

Students are responsible for work missed while absent and should contact teachers before or after school to discuss make-up assignments. Students will be expected to submit missing work within two school days following each day of absence. In laboratory classes, special arrangements may need to be made for making up a laboratory activity. Some work cannot be made up because of its nature: a rented film, guest speaker, demonstrations or performances.

SIGN IN - SIGN OUT PROCEDURES

When a student arrives late to school, he or she is expected to report to the office and sign the Sign In – Sign Out Log. At that time, the student should request an admit slip to class. The student is expected to show the admit slip to his or her teacher upon returning to class after an absence.

If a student finds it necessary to leave the building for any reason, he or she is expected to come to the office and request permission to sign out. Before leaving school grounds, verification of parental approval through a note submitted to the office or through a telephone conversation between the parent/guardian and a member of the office staff must be made.

Students who leave school without following proper procedure for checking out will not be excused even if parents call in later. Failure to follow proper procedure will result in a Friday School.

DRUG-FREE SCHOOL POLICY

It is the policy of U.S.D. #343 for the administration to make necessary searches of lockers and/or student property if there is reasonable suspicion that matter prohibited by law or school regulations exists. In addition, the administration may authorize law enforcement officers or licensed private agencies to use trained dogs on school premises to identify student property which may contain illegal or illicit materials and to determine whether materials are present which may threaten the general health, welfare, and safety of students and/or district employees.

GUN-FREE SCHOOLS POLICY

A student will not knowingly possess, handle, or transmit any object that can reasonably be considered a weapon on the school grounds, off the school grounds, or at a school activity, function, or event.

This policy shall include any weapon, any item being used as a weapon or destructive device, or any facsimile of a weapon.

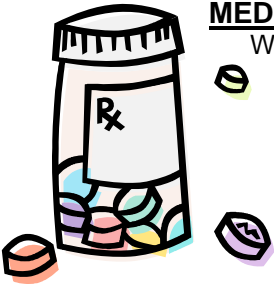
Possession of a firearm shall result in expulsion from school for a period of one year (186 days). The superintendent may recommend that this expulsion requirement be modified on a case-by-case basis under the provisions of the JDC policy (probation).

As used in this policy, the term "firearm" means any weapon (including a starter gun) which will or is designed to or may readily be converted to expel a projectile by the action of any explosive, the frame or receiver of any such weapon, any firearm muffler or silencer or any destructive device.

As used in this policy, the term "destructive device" means any explosive, incendiary or poison gas, bomb, grenade rocket having a propellant charge of more than four ounces, missile having an explosive or incendiary charge of more than one-quarter ounce, mine, or other device similar to any of these devices.

PUBLIC DISPLAY OF AFFECTION POLICY

Some public displays of affection may be offensive to others; therefore, students should conduct themselves in a manner that is suitable for any work or public place. Kissing is not permitted. Other than holding hands, physical contact is not considered appropriate. Students who demonstrate disregard for this policy will be placed on a behavior plan.



MEDICATION POLICY AND PROCEDURES

When medication is required during the school day and school personnel are requested to dispense the

- medication, please follow these procedures:
 - bring only a daily dosage of a prescription
 - medication must be in the original container provided by the pharmacy
 - bring medication to the office prior to the start of school on the day it is to be administered
 - furnish a request (provided by school and also available online) signed by the parent with the medication

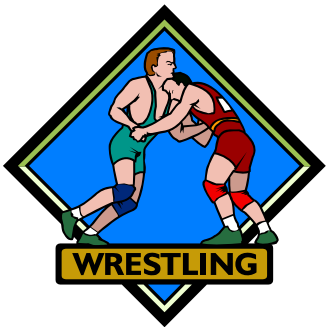

PSAT – 19 students took the PSAT in mid October. Scores will be sent in December. Participating students will be met with individually to review them.

PLAN – This is just another reminder about the PLAN, which will be given this year to all sophomores. This test is given to not only to prepare students for the ACT test, but to also give both parents and students some additional information such as:

1. If the student is on track for college
2. The student's academic strengths and areas that need improvement
3. Helping students find careers that match their interests
4. Connecting students with more colleges of interest

Students will be tested on the same subjects as the ACT (English, Mathematics, Reading and Science), and they will be given an estimated ACT score. Once the scores have been received, we will go over these with the students.

The test will be given during the afternoon of November 2nd at **NO** cost.

COLLEGE VISITS – Seniors are encouraged to take college visits to meet with officials and gather information about the admission process, financial aid and other information about the college. However, students need to get a College Visit Form from Mrs. Paramore before going on a visit. This form must be filled out and returned to the office **before** the student goes on the visit in order for the absent to be excused.

CREDIT CHECKS – We are in the process of completing credit checks for the current seniors to just double check that everything is in order before graduation. Mrs. Paramore will meet individually with each senior before the end of the semester to discuss graduation and future plans. Credit checks will also be completed for the current juniors. These will be discussed with the students before the beginning of enrollment next semester.

ACT TEST PREP CLASS – This is another notice/reminder that we will be offering two ACT Prep classes next semester. College-bound sophomores and juniors planning are encouraged to take this class. These classes are new additions to the schedule, so students need to see Mrs. Paramore as soon as possible if they are interested in getting in the class next semester.

ACT Online Prep – This program is still available to students and it is beneficial because it can be accessed at home. Students will take a diagnostic test to help determine areas they need to study first. It is also helpful in pin-pointing and remediating student weaknesses in ACT subjects. They learn their strengths, too!

All students are eligible to receive an ACT online code! **If your student had a code and lost it or needs a code, please have him or her come see either Mrs. Chamberlain or Mrs. Paramore!** We are committed to strong ACT scores and we know that test preparedness along with a strong curriculum make the difference in our student scores!

FINANCIAL AID NIGHT – Our *Financial Aid Night* will be November 30 in the PLHS Little Theatre and will begin at 6:30. A representative from Washburn University’s Financial Aid Office will be in attendance to take you through the financial aid process.

Students apply for financial aid using **FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)**. This online application cannot be submitted until after the first of the year so the Financial Aid Night will be a great opportunity to get your questions answered and determine what information you will need when you are ready to begin the process. We hope to see you there!

SCHOLARSHIPS – Don’t forget to look at the Scholarship Link found on the district website. All scholarships that go through the Counselor’s Office will be listed there. Scholarships will be added and updated throughout the semester, so keep checking to see what scholarships are available.

KAW EXCEL PROGRAM

This program was developed with the intent to reward students who follow appropriate school behavior on a regular basis. A reward of one personal day or "day off" the following semester is awarded to eligible students. Spring semester, seniors can earn a personal day in May if they meet the criteria by May 1. Nine week grades will be used for GPA information.

Within the semester, a student will accrue:

1. Less than 2 points on the Discipline point system.
2. 4 or fewer excused absences per class period.
3. no unexcused absences
4. must be a student in good standing

Notification from the Honor Panel will be given to those students who meet all criteria. Only a student in good standing is eligible for personal day. Eligible students must submit to the office a personal day request that:

1. is submitted 48 hours before the requested date of leave; leave date must be taken on or before Dec. 1, (1st semester) and May 1, (2nd semester)
2. contains parental permission
3. indicates approval by all teachers
4. if the student takes a personal day, they must still be in school one-half day to participate in any school activity. Exceptions can only be made by the administration.

The following students have met the criteria to be named to the Kaw Excel Program for the Spring semester of 2011 and are eligible for a personal day this semester under the guidelines of the Excel Program. The deadline to use the personal day is **Thursday, December 1, 2011.**

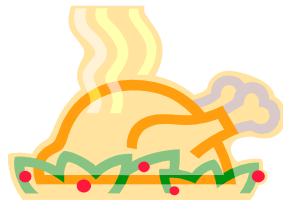
