A Note from the Superintendent... J.B. Elliott

We have such talent displayed in our high school and middle school students who are singers, musicians, writers, artists, athletes, and scholars in many different subjects. In addition, we have such inquisitive, eager young learners in our elementary schools that just soak up knowledge at such a rapid rate. It is exciting to see these younger students flourish and grow and before we know it, they will be in upper level grades and be those singers, musicians, writers, artists, athletes and scholars forging their own paths, just as the students before them!

The enthusiasm and the innovativeness of the teachers and paras in our classrooms is catching! They bring excitement and energy district wide that is contagious. From Kindergarten students sitting in a reading circle engaged in a story, to students sitting at science tables in the high school engaged in dissecting a science specimen, to students at all grade levels giving back to their communities through community service events. You can't help but feel proud knowing these achieving students are getting a quality education from people that truly care about their successes now, and care about their future as well.

One of the things that makes our district a great district is the remarkable and awesome students we have, and having the privilege of being able to watch their growth and success every year as a KAW! The caring and dedication of our great district team of cooks, custodians, bus drivers, maintenance workers, building office staff, district office staff, bus barn staff, coaches, teachers, and paras is one of the many reasons why our district is such an outstanding place to be! I would also like to recognize that without the support our district receives from the parents, community members, and businesses we would not be as successful as we are. All of these groups of people combine to make our District such a unique and inspiring place to educate students and prepare them for their future. So, as you can see, as a district, we have many great things going on that make us feel proud to be a KAW!

With this school year coming to an end, and a new one coming upon us quicker than we think, I want to keep you updated on the school-funding situation for the 17-18 school year. As of the second week of June, the new school funding formula has been created with Senate Bill 19. It has passed the House and the Senate. It currently sits on the Governor's desk for consideration. He can sign it into law, veto it, or let it become law without any action.

The new formula looks similar to the previous funding formula used prior to 2015 in terms of the amount of base state aid. Historically, base state aid per student was as high as \$4,400 in 2008. Due to budget cuts in previous years, we are currently at \$3,852. The new formula would set the base state aid amount at \$4,006 in 2017-18 and gradually increase to \$4,317 by the 2020-2021 school year. USD #343 would not see an increase in total funding from this formula due to the overall decrease in student enrollment district wide. In fact, the proposed increase to base state aid per student, along with the decrease to enrollment would result in approximately \$31,000 less budget dollars in the 2017-18 school year for our school district. Here are other key components of the new funding formula:

- Student count (enrollment) will be based the prior year or second prior year's enrollment, whichever is higher.
- Funding for at-risk students will be based upon free lunch count, just as the previous formula. However, the weighting for at risk enrollment increases from .456 to .484.
- All day Kindergarten will be fully funded.
- An increase to state aid for 4-year old at risk programs. (2 million statewide increase.)
- Overall funding for Special Education will be increase. (12 million statewide increase.)
- Bilingual education will be computed using the higher of .395 of the contact hours or .185 of the bilingual headcount enrollment for students who qualify for services.

As you may recall, the Supreme Court issued an order to the Kansas Legislature to produce an adequate and equitable school finance formula by June 30, 2017. Although a finance formula has now been produced, I would point out there is still a chance the Supreme Court may rule that it is still not up to par. The main reason would be the base state aid per pupil amount. Remember, schools were funded at \$4,400 per student basis in 2008. This formula does not reach that funding mark next year or by 2021. Only time will tell! It could be an interesting summer!

Solar Eclipse Field Trip

Early preparations are being made for the Great American Solar Eclipse of Aug. 21, 2017 — and the sun's position on April 19, 20 and 21, but especially April 20, offered a perfect dress rehearsal for that historic event. School personnel have been working with a neighboring school district to reserve space for our students to observe the solar eclipse on August 21, 2017. The planned field trip will occur during a normal school day where students in grades 2 – 12 will travel about an hour and a half to Troy, Kansas.

According to several information sites, when preparing for the eclipse, an important aspect to consider is the sun's location in the sky for your location. Across the western third of the United States, the eclipse will reach its peak during the late morning hours. Over the nation's midsection, the maximum eclipse will come at midday, and for the eastern third of the country, the time of greatest coverage of the sun by the moon will happen in early to mid-afternoon. Troy, Kansas located in Doniphan County is considered to be a nearly ideal location for viewing. Families are encouraged to join us for this historic event!

Preparing Perry-Lecompton Students for Success

Preparing students for the work force in an ever-changing world can be a challenge. The Kansas Department of Education recently shared research from the Georgetown Center on Education and the Workforce, which predicts that 71% of the Kansas workforce will need some sort of post-secondary training or certification by the year 2020. Rather it be a four-year university degree, a two-year Associates degree, technical school training and certification or completion of military basic training and technical school, by the year 2020, nearly ¾ of the jobs available will require some sort of certification or degree. As a result of this research, the Kansas Department of Education and USD 343, as well as other public schools across this great state are collaborating to meet this future job market demand.

The Kansas State Board of Education adopted five measureable outcomes that will assist schools in preparing our students. These outcomes were the result of personal conversations between Kansas Department of Education Commission Dr. Randy Watson and statewide stakeholders such as educators, parents, students and community business leaders. After multiple roundtable discussion, the Kansas State Board of Education adopted the following outcomes to assist public and participating private schools with preparing our students for the future demands of the Kansas workforce. - [Kindergarten Readiness](#) - Kansas districts will evaluate and seek more efficient ways to determine kindergarten readiness, and will determine how to best help parents prepare their child for that important first year of education.
- [Social/Emotional Growth](#) - In an effort to prepare our students to be successful adults, each Kansas school district will determine how to monitor and help our students develop social/emotional skills such as emotional regulation and impulse control, appropriate social etiquette and most importantly, self-confidence.
- [Individual Plans of Study \(IPS\)](#) - This is an individualize plan of study that every student will create in middle school. The intent is to expose students to careers, which match their interests. The IPS will show students possible high school and post-secondary education requirements, projected expense, which colleges, technical schools, or military branch offers degrees or certification in the student's field of interest, as well as other relevant information.
- [High School Graduation Rates](#) - Kansas hopes to lead the world in high school graduation rates. Currently, the Kansas average is 85%. Portugal currently graduates the highest percentage of high school students with an average in the low to mid 90's. In recent years, the PLHS graduation rate has averaged around 94%, so USD 343 students are in line with the best in the world. We plan to do better!
- [Post-Secondary Completion and Attendance](#) - To meet this outcome, students must complete one year of college, or complete one year of technical school, or possibly join the military and successfully complete basic military training and military technical school. The need for some sort of post-secondary college diploma or technical school certification is the result of our current job market. During the recent economic recovery, 99% of the jobs added to the labor market required some college or technical training.

Perry-Lecompton Schools understand that an important part of our success lies with collaborating with students and parents. Perhaps Perry-Lecompton parents remember the perceptual surveys that were sent out in late April/early May. These surveys are part of our effort to determine areas of improvement for our school district based on parent and student perceptions. Your thoughts and opinions are important and will certainly influence our focus areas of improvement. A district leadership team, along with a district site council team will work together to establish our goal areas for the 2017-2018 school year and beyond. The Kansans CAN





As the 2016-17 school year comes to a rapid close, spring sports are still in full swing and our teams are gearing up for possible post-season runs in their respective sports. PLHS Softball has jumped out to a 12-2 record and looks poised to make a run at a Regional championship. The baseball team has started off with a 7-4 record and has scratched out some tough wins along the way. Both teams have three doubleheaders remaining before starting Regional play the week of May 15.

The Track team has good numbers out this year and has several athletes putting up performances that put them among the top in 3A competition. They ran Regional track at Silver Lake on May 19 with the hopes of having several qualify for the State meet the following week in Wichita.

The golf team keeps a busy schedule and has already competed in several tournaments and competed at the Regional tournament on May 15th.

Overall, the PLHS sports teams have had a very successful year. In the fall, PLHS Tennis had four State qualifiers, while the football team made the playoffs.
